Welcome

The League of Friends welcomes you to Heatherwood hospital and hopes you will have a pleasant stay and enjoy the services we provide.

The League was registered as a charity in 1988 (900282) although it has been carrying out it's charity work at Heatherwood since 1958.

We are a charity dedicated to providing those facilities, extra comforts and support for patients or staff of Heatherwood hospital.

We have two activities on the hospital which provide support for the patients. The first activity is our trolley shop which visits the wards every Monday Wednesday or Friday afternoons, it is there for those sweets toiletries or stationery items, which may be required by patients. The second activity on the hospital is our patients radio request service: Radio Heatherwood, which broadcasts most evenings. A total of over 50 volunteers help maintain these services each week.

In addition to providing these essential services, the League each year raises funds for the hospital, along with income from our investments we are able to allocate gifts of medical equipment, or offer monetary support for patient/staff projects.

It's only a hospital radio service!!

Established since 1976

It's only a hospital radio service, but the service we provide, must deliver a presentation style which is equal to any local or national radio station output.

The service you hear today is very much different from those early days; where if you could put a record on: you were automatically given the freedom of the airwaves. Todays presenters must undergo a comprehensive training on equipment and presentation, this will include the guidelines as laid down by the Radio Authority.

A trainee may have to wait 6 months before he/she is allowed to broadcast on their own. In the early days the quality of presentation output was unique; under todays guidelines from the Radio Authority: it wouldn't be tolerated.

One of the rules for all presenters is they must carry out ward rounds and collect requests before their program. This is strictly adhered to and makes Radio Heatherwood one of the few hospital radio services which is valued by the patients. Our early service prior to 1982 did not enforce this condition and therefore led to some very poor program content.

How Much Does It Cost?

The radio service is run as a self supporting member of the League, raising it's own running costs each year. This has steadily increased over the years from £250 to £3000 a year.

It's a hard task each year raising the running costs. The fundraising by the volunteers takes various forms from appeals for old records and tapes; to dinner dances (Sweethearts ball) charity

stalls at Bracknell market, annual grand draw, and charity coach outings. We also receive support for the service from local businesses, local trust funds and members of the public who all contribute in their own way.

The station relies on the commitment of 20-25 volunteers each year to maintain the radio service.

When & How Did We Start Broadcasting?

Radio Heatherwood first began regular transmissions in 1976 although a service was available prior to this. It wasn't until an injection of £6000 on equipment and bedhead units in early 1976, the first regular service was provided each evening on channel 3.

The launch of the radio service on the 10th June 1976 was officiated by Michael Parkinson who was then honorary patron.

After an ambitious start by the station, by the end of 1981, the station had fallen into the red and was in danger of being closed down.

In 1982 the present manager Dave Smith was appointed along with his brother Peter, to try and bring some discipline and turn the fortunes of the service around.

Over the next eight years the service went through a complete restructure of it's facilities and the way in which it is maintained and received on the wards. Large amounts of sponsorship from local trusts and businesses etc. All contributed to the service you hear today.



One of the major advances for the service came in 1987 when during this year over £10,000 was raised to provide the AM service, which is

available today.

The introduction of the AM service and the need for this type of was prompted by deterioration of the bedhead units, which are very costly repair. Each replacement bedhead unit above your bed costs £70 to replace. The plastic headsets are also £2-3 a time. (this system is maintained by the hospital).

In February 1988 the AM service was switched on and a new era for the radio station began. Radio Heatherwood was the fifth hospital radio station in the UK to have this service: there are currently 24.

In 1990 the Sunninghill Fuel Allotment trust, one of the major contributers to the radio service: opened the second studio which allows production and training. It was the end of an era for the station, all the old bad practises had been thrown away, the station was very much in the black and the praise for the service from patients and staff, has vindicated the new set up.

This is by no means the end of the story: 1990 saw the launch of the loan radio service which today stands at 186 units on five wards. The period 1991 to 1994 saw the replacement of worn out equipment and some subtle changes to studio one.

In 1994 the trust management board allocated another adjoining

room to the studios, which has allowed us to provide proper reception facilities for visitors and allow wheelchair access to the production area. This was completed in July 1995.

It's a never ending story as the station strives to provide a quality service for the patients of Heatherwood. We mustn't forget the contribution of those people who in their own way, offered support over the years and allowed Radio Heatherwood to be truly a friend at the bedside.

Radio Heatherwood How does it work & Can I get you at Home?

The most popular question that we receive when we are on wards comes from those listening to Radio Heatherwood on a portable radio, " can I get vou at home "?.

The answer is no: our signal is only received on hospital property, once you leave the hospital site the signal fades awav.

The system we broadcast on is very different to that of local or national radio, instead of a single aerial we have 31 aerials placed around the hospital. A signal induced into them at 999khz AM. The one advantage we have over other AM stations becomes appearant. out, ours remains constant day or night Am Radio For Hospital Patients without interference without interference.

The system was installed in the hospital in an effort to provide quality radio and a system which is easy to maintain without continued expensive costs. It also allows the freedom of listening to the hospital radio without being tied to the bedhead. The £10.000

or this system was raised by the radio staff in 1987.

On Easter Saturday 1988 the then Mayor of Windsor & Maidenhead district council: Bill Cooley launched the AM service.



Heatherwood have endeavoured to provide a small personal radio in your bedside locker. These radios are unlike other radios you may have encountered. They have some special modifications which allow you to tune into the hospital radio service, most evenings of the week (Radio Heatherwood). During the day time, this radio will allow you to listen to BBC Radio Two, which is transmitted on the radio stations frequency of 999kHz AM.

Each evening the radio staff will conduct ward rounds, taking requests from patients and ensuring patients have access to a loan radio.

Whilst you remain a patient at Heatherwood, this radio is available for you to enjoy the service provided by the volunteers of Radio Heatherwood.

During your stay, you are free to use the loan radio in your locker.

The radio does require a battery

The League of Friends & Radio (9 volt PP3). The League of Friends offers a subsidised price for batteries. replacement can purchased from the League of Friends trolley shop, Mondays, Wednesdays and Friday afternoons for the sum of £1. The batteries are also readily available each evening from the radio volunteers who collect requests from your ward.

Batteries can also be delivered to your bedside during the evening.

Patient Record Requests

Our radio volunteers visit the wards on a rotational basis, to collect your requests, once the time slots are filled, a note of where the staff have finished, is then left for the staff on the next broadcast night.

It usually means that a ward will not be visited on one evening a week, this does not stop anyone from calling the studio with a dedication, you may be lucky in finding an odd request slot is available.

When you are asked for a request and you decide to have one, you will be given a chance to have your request in a particular half hour time slot, I.E. 20-00 to 20-30, 20-30 to 21-00. Etc.



If you are reading this booklet as a patient in bed on one of the wards of Heatherwood, you will find at the head of your bed on the wall, the internal radio system. Some are hand held selector boxes, others are fixed to the wall.

This system is not under the maintenance control of the hospital

radio volunteers. If you find the bedhead system is not working above your bed: you should direct your concerns to the hospital management.

We do broadcast on the bedhead system as well as your normal AM/MW radio.

If you find the internal radio at your bedhead is faulty, you can still listen to the hospital radio service on your own portable radio, (999kHz AM) or on one of the loan radio sets which you may find in your locker.

The loan radio service operates on wards, 1, 3, 4, 5, 10.

The loan radio is also you entertainment during the daytime.

League of Friends Trolley Shop

Established since 1972



The trolley shop tries to cater for the main needs of members of the public who have been hospitalised. The trolley shop sells a variety of goods: essential toiletries, sweets and chocolates, soft drinks, stationery, stamps, batteries and much much more. On the trolley shop; space has to be used wisely and also we must remember, it can get too heavy to push around. Proceeds from the sale of goods swells the funds of the League of Friends.

The League of Friends trolley shop was started in 1972, by Mrs May Ettridge with the help of her late husband. Mrs Ettridge has given 24 years dedicated service to the trolley shop. At the sprightly age of 88; May is still concerned with the trolley shop today but has taken a back seat to allow the current manager. League Secretary: Mrs Marion Rathbone to continue the sterling work.

The day to day running of the trolley shop which involves organising volunteers arranging replacement stock is all carried out in the spare moments of Mrs Rathbone and her volunteers. The trolley shop has 27 volunteers ensuring the service continues on the wards each week; come rain or shine.

In 1996 congratulations are in order as the trolley shop clocks up 24 years service to the patients and staff of Heatherwood hospital. A tribute to the past and present volunteers who have worked on the trolley shop.

Radio Heatherwood Supporters Group Established since 1990 Radio Heatherwood Supporters Group

The supporters group is made up from the people who at one time or another have been on the annual Charity Buzz trips, or they are family or friends of these people.

During the South Wales tour of 1990 a questionaire was given to everyone to answer. The result was very pleasing and led to the set up of the RHSG.

The main difference between the Radio Charity Buzz and the Heatherwood supporters group, everything is hired commercially, coaches, entrance fees, etc, all have to be paid for. The one thing that is the same as the Charity Buzz, all the profits from these trips go to the League of Friends radio station funds (Radio Heatherwood).

The first RHSG outing was to Minehead in Somerset in Sept 1990 returning home via the West Somerset railway from Minehead to Bishops Lydeard picking up the coach home. The cost to members for the Minehead trip £14. Members are picked up and set down at various points in the Bracknell, Wokingham & Ascot areas.

The most ambitious outing was in November 1990, a weekend in Perranporth Cornwall.

We left the Friday dinner time from Bracknell arriving to an evening meal. Saturday; a shopping and sightseeing

tour. Sunday; Lands End via a sightseeing route.

Monday; return home via Dartmoor arriving home early evening. During our stay at the hotel it was at half board and evening entertainment was also

provided. The cost to members for the Cornwall break £70.

The total funds raised through the Charity Buzz & RHSG for 1990 is just a little under £1200.

In 1991 there was three trips.

In 1992 this was extended to 5 trips plus the annual Charity Buzz trip.

Each year the supporters group enjoys a wide variety of coach trips.

Whether it is the Charity Buzz or RHSG, the aim is the same, to have a good day out and enjoy ourselves, at the same time, raise funds for our favourite charity.

Since 1994, eight day trips and two holidays are organised each year.

Charity Buzz 1987 to 1996

Established since 1987

The Charity Buzz coach trips in aid of the League of Friends radio service (Radio Heatherwood); was born in 1987 as part of the fundraising events in that year. It was an attempt to provide something different, something that a good time was had by all and money would be raised in the process.

A very enthusiastic response was received from the Bee-line not only by them, but also my work colleagues gave their support for the venture.

May 88

A new regular departure for Charity Buzz also an increase to 2 coaches and two more volunteer drivers. A North Devon tour takes in Lynton & Lynmouth and on to Ilfracoombe for tea. **Dec 88**



Broadcasting Complaints



Our program content must be of a reasonable quality. If you feel that Radio Heatherwood has given you good cause to complain about the content of one of it's programmes, ie decency and good taste etc. In the first instance you should write to:-

Radio Secretary Radio Heatherwood Kings Ride Ascot SL5 8AA.

Stating the day and time of the offending broadcast. The complaint will then be investigated by the station's management.

You will then be informed of the result of those investigations in writing; at the same time you will be informed of your rights with regards to the procedure, should you be dissatisfied with our written reply.

Radio Heatherwood is bound by law to forward to you, the procedure for registering your complaint with the Radio Authority.

Radio Heatherwood can only deal with formal complaints in writing, within 42 days of the alleged offending broadcast. A formal complaint either verbally or beyond the 42 days limit cannot be entertained.

Radio Heatherwood is issued a licence to broadcast by the Radio Authority and must abide by the guidelines set out, in that document.

Radio Heatherwood is treated no differently than any other broadcaster in • the UK.

The above guidelines is appertaining to the content of a transmitted programme, not the means by which it is received.
